Grade Requirements

In order to advance to the second year of the Criminology Program, students must obtain in their first year of study

- at least a B (70%) or above in CRIM 1650, and
- an overall GPA of 5.0 (C+) or above.

After first year, students must maintain an **overall GPA of 5.0 (C+) or above** in the subsequent years of study in order to graduate in this Honours program.

Students who fail to meet these grade requirements will be removed from the Criminology Program.
